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Celebrating 15 Years of Progress: Reflecting on 2023

In 2023, Canucks Autism Network (CAN) commemorated a significant milestone - our 15th anniversary. This pivotal year prompted us to reflect on our journey, acknowledging both our triumphs and our learnings.

From our modest beginnings as a children's charity offering one soccer program, we've evolved into a multifaceted organization, as showcased in the pages of this report. Our growth stands as a testament to the passion and dedication of our founders, Board of Directors, staff, volunteers, members, and supporters, all of whom make up our CAN community.

This past year marked an overwhelming influx in demand for our children's programs, highlighting the rising need for support. Meanwhile, our youth and adult programs continued to expand in the areas of employment, recreation, and life skills training. Innovative mental health programming for Autistic youth and adults took center stage, underscoring our commitment to holistic well-being.

Our critical work in the mental health space extended to our training arm where we partnered with groups such as Foundry BC and the Crisis Line BC to improve accessibility of the mental health system. Requests for autism training and consultation services continued to rise, reflecting a growing commitment to accessibility and inclusion across sectors and communities.





Operationally, we made significant strides in improving efficiencies, investing in new registration, accounting, and employee orientation systems. These enhancements enabled us to scale up our programs and training initiatives in a much more efficient and cost-effective manner.

Our fifteenth year also saw record-high support for key fundraising events including our CAN Pro-Am Hockey Tournament, the Dave McAnerney Ride for Autism, and an abundance of third-party fundraisers. Moreover, we forged exciting new partnerships with various communities, funders, and organizations.

We recognize that we couldn't do all that we do without the unwavering support of our donors, partners, and supporters who believe in helping Autistic individuals live their best lives. We would be remiss if we didn't underscore the notable contribution of our core funder– the Canucks for Kids Fund.

Looking ahead to 2024, strategic planning takes precedence as we envision the next four years for CAN. Key themes include exploring new revenue streams, leveraging partnerships, enhancing operational efficiencies, and delivering exceptional programs and services for our ever-growing CAN community.

Children's Programs

Our children's programs allow participants to develop skills while practicing following group instructions and building social connections in a fun, safe and supportive environment.

- We introduced a creative dance program in Surrey in partnership with Arts Umbrella
- CAN's presence in the Fraser Valley expanded significantly, with nine programs, including gymnastics, now being offered.
- We continued to expose CAN participants to new sports such as baseball and tennis and introduced intersquad scrimmages in our hockey program.

YOUTH AND ADULT PROGRAMS





Youth & Adult Programs

CAN introduced several new programs, workshops, and services that empower Autistic youth and adults to develop positive mental health practices, build self-confidence and social connections, and thrive in their communities.

- This past year, we launched the Leisure Ed program, based on consultation from the autism community. The goal of the program is to help participants identify and meet their community recreation goals through individualized supports and group sessions.
- Our **Women's Peer Group** for Autistic women, gender nonconforming, and gender-diverse folks continued to grow in demand, with over 70 participants interested in the bi-monthly meetings.
- In Spring 2023, the Transition to Adulthood program, supported by RBC, provided Autistic participants, aged 15-25, with the opportunity to learn life skills (eg. public transit use, cooking basics), career skills (eg. resume building, volunteering), and self-care strategies (eg. mental health maintenance).





CAN is dedicated to increasing Autistic leadership across all levels, respecting and consulting with the diverse community we serve. This past year, we hired **8 Autistic Peer Facilitators** who are now developing, running, and facilitating various peer groups and programs.

EMPLOYMENT PROGRAMS AND SERVICES

Ready, Willing & Able (RWA) is a national initiative that engages, educates and supports employers to hire people on the autism spectrum or with an intellectual disability. Canucks Autism Network is a provincial delivery partner of RWA in British Columbia.

Lower Mainland

Navigation: 44 Autistic job seekers were connected with employment supports. **Employer Engagement:** 41Autistic job seekers were successfully hired.

Kelowna

Navigation: 6 Autistic job seekers were connected with employment supports. **Employer Engagement:** 18 Autistic job seekers were successfully hired.

CAN Skills Training Employment Program (CAN-STEP)

This program is funded by Government of Canada's Youth Employment and Skills Strategy (YESS) program

Over the course of 12 weeks, Autistic youth and adults receive paid classroom training and work experience across the Lower Mainland.

- The program took place from January 2021-December 2023.
- 46 of the 85 program participants are now employed, representing a
 54% employment rate.





CAN-STEP Participant Spotlight

Henry Woo

Henry Woo joined CAN-STEP in July 2023 and quickly became a valued member of the classroom.

He then secured his dream work experience at the Vancouver Aquarium where his contributions were recognized, and he was eventually hired permanently.

Since then, Henry has continued to be an asset and was even chosen by the Vancouver Tourism Board to receive an award for Excellence in Customer Service based on the following review:

"I was trying to get a highchair out and this employee named Henry W noticed right away and came to help me, and then thoroughly cleaned it before he offered to take it to my table. As I sat there, he went around to every table and literally picked up people's jackets off the floor and went above and beyond to be helpful. I was really impressed."

INCLUSIVE EMPLOYMENT







Our Commitment to Inclusive Employment

We believe that every Autistic individual has the right to equitable access to meaningful employment.

- We introduced the role of Supported Employment
 Specialist to support and increase inclusive hiring efforts
 across the organization. Engagement with employment
 and educational organizations such as Work BC and
 Vancouver Community College resulted in a significant
 increase in supported staff and volunteer placements.
- We introduced Job Coaches to support Program Staff on the autism spectrum.
- We increased our focus on professional development for staff and volunteers on the autism spectrum to support the transition from CAN Volunteer to Program Assistant to Support Worker and even Coach and Onsite Supervisor roles.
- Autistic staff designed and led programs for Autistic youth and adults.



The backbone of our organization

Our volunteer program experienced significant growth for the first time since the pandemic. We hired and onboarded 255 new volunteers and logged **4,731 volunteer hours**.

Internal Training Numbers

- 2,014 staff received CAN training
- 318 volunteers received **CAN** training

To meet the demand of our growing portfolio of programs, we employed over 550 program staff, which included hiring 259 new staff.



TRAINING AND ACCESSIBILITY CONSULTATION





Training & Consultation Highlights

- Nak'azdli Whut'en First Nation Training: CAN delivered two trainings to over 80 individuals in the community of Fort St. James. Attendees included childcare workers, recreation staff, teachers and school administration.
- Lifesaving Society Visuals: CAN created swim visuals that will be used across the province by CAN staff and Lifesaving Society Swim Instructors.
- Autism Aviation Day Event at YYJ: On April 29, 2023, Victoria
 International Airport (YYJ) and Air Canada Foundation welcomed
 over 50 CAN members for Autism Aviation Day. The event allowed
 families to rehearse the entire pre-flight process including
 checking in, going through security, waiting at the gate, and
 boarding the plane. The practice run aims to help increase
 predictability and decrease anxiety associated with the entire air
 travel process.
- A total of 76 training workshops were delivered to the following sectors: sport, recreation, schools, first responders and community spaces.
- In 2023, CAN hosted Sensory Friendly Spaces* at 15 different events including the Vancouver International film Festival and the Vancouver Pride Parade. CAN was also invited to showcase Sensory Friendly Spaces and Sensory Kits at the Union of BC Municipalities Convention.



^{*}Sensory Friendly Spaces are designated areas with reduced input (lowered lighting and sound) from the sensory environment.

Training Resources for BC Crisis Centre Workers

We partnered with the BC Crisis Centre to provide autism training to their frontline staff that focused on best practices and strategies for supporting Autistic individuals accessing Crisis Centre services.

CAN youth and adult program staff were also given the opportunity to receive suicide intervention skills training from the Crisis Centre to better meet the needs of CAN participants.

Following the success of this training, CAN partnered with the Crisis Line Network of BC, including the Crisis Intervention & Suicide Prevention Centre of BC, Crisis Centre of Northern BC, and Canadian Mental Health Association, Cariboo Chilcotin to begin to develop a new autism-informed e-learning resource for crisis response organizations. A team of Autistic Advisors and Clinicians are also part of the advisory group.

Autism-Informed Training for Foundry BC Staff, Clinicians, and Peer Support Workers

Building off the success of our initial Autism-informed Youth Peer Support Training Module in partnership with Foundry BC, CAN developed two additional e-learning modules for Foundry's frontline service staff and clinical staff. The content was developed with direct input from subject matter experts engaged in professional clinical practice who directly support the mental health needs of Autistic individuals, Foundry staff, and Autistic self-advocates

Arena staff received CAN autism training and various sensory adaptations were made to ensure the arenas and games were autism accessible. Resources for fans on the spectrum included:

- A designated quiet room for anyone needing a break from the sensory-rich environment.
- CAN sensory kits containing sensory toys to reduce anxiety, a schedule of the game to improve predictability, and noise-cancelling headphones to ease sensory sensitivities.




CAN PRO-AM

Since its inaugural year in 2019, this annual charitable hockey tournament has continued to reach new fundraising heights, and the 2023 CAN Pro-Am, presented by Dallas Watt Demo Ltd, was no exception.

Held at Parq Vancouver, Good Co. Granville, and North Surrey Sport & Ice Complex, the event featured **18 teams**, **21 NHL Alumni**, and over **290 rec players** determined to make a difference.

After months of fundraising, players succeeded in raising an all-time high of over **\$1.07 million** in support of CAN.



The event culminated in an All-Star Game, sponsored by Nightingale Electrical Ltd, featuring the top 25 fundraisers who went above and beyond to support the cause. It was a fitting end to a weekend dedicated to helping individuals on the autism spectrum live their best lives.





HARVEY SOHI BALL HOCKEY TOURNAMENT

In 2022, the Harvey Sohi Foundation, founded in memory of Harvey Sohi, presented CAN with an idea that would bring together generations of families to make a positive impact. An event that would encapsulate Harvey's core values of inclusion and community.

On March 5, the Foundation hosted their inaugural charity Ball Hockey Tournament in support of Canucks Autism Network. The event continued to gain momentum in 2023 with even more teams, sponsors, volunteers, and family members stepping up to support.

To date, \$41,232 has been raised for CAN, with another charity tournament slated for 2024.

CANADIAN TIRE JUMPSTART CHARITIES

To help develop and sustain sports and recreation programming for kids, Canadian Tire Jumpstart Charities has been supporting CAN's core sports programs since 2017.

In 2023, their cumulative donations surpassed \$500,000.00! Together, CAN and Jumpstart have developed an e-learning course called Supporting Positive Behavior, which is required for coaches within all organizations, and is funded by Jumpstart across Canada.

TD BANK

Recognizing the support connected communities can provide one another, TD Bank Group sponsored five Family Experiences across BC in 2023.



In 2022-2023 fiscal year, children's programs continued to grow, resulting in an impressive 29% increase in participant numbers.

In Q2 and Q3, CAN adopted a more mindful, data-driven approach to program planning to better align offerings to demand, while ultimately reducing waitlists. As a result, CAN not only surpassed its program targets but invested in additional spaces in existing programs and introduced several new programs in all regions, with the Fraser Valley (50% growth) and Kamloops (41% growth) showing the highest growth.

CAN's mental health programming continued to grow and attract the attention of funders. In March 2023, the program received \$540,000 from the Ministry of Mental Health and Addictions, most of which (78%) will be deferred to the next fiscal. In February 2023, we received confirmation from Employment and Social Development Canada that the Opportunity Fund application was successful, meaning that the CAN-STEP program will be extended until the end of 2025.

Despite the few fundraising initiatives that were cancelled or postponed, we anticipate that CAN will come very close to reaching its revenue goal and raise a total of \$7.6M (\$7.3M in 2021-2022). The Canucks for Kids Fund, special events, foundations, and government funding remain our largest sources of revenue (\$6.4M or 85%).

We project that the prior years' surpluses will be fully utilized by the end of 2022-23, marking the end of the program expansion phase. In 2023-2024, CAN will focus on maintaining a balanced budget and further diversifying its revenue streams to sustain current program levels.
